Children enjoyed a wide range of workshops from Discovery Park and Pfizer exhibitors who brought with them a wealth of knowledge and skills to share with our pupils. Sessions included Pfantastic Fire, Hi-Five, Microbe, Crime Scene Investigations, Hydrogen Bubbles, The Wonderful World of Waves and Magic Glass. Meanwhile our teachers delivered sessions including K'nex Roller Coasters, Heat Seeking Cameras, Biological Drawings, Space -The Final Frontier and Kapla building. or your worries will grow!

Mindfulness, which is practised daily in Years 3 to 6, is seen as a time to be calm and tune into your body and how you are feeling. It was demonstrated when the whole audience was invited to participate in one of 3Fs favourite Mindfulness activities. Being Mindful can help to reduce worry and the

Mindful Breathing we learn to do in class, can help people to feel more calm. Meet our University trainee teachers



As a Canterbury Christchurch University partnership school, St Faith's Prep has welcomed four PGCE students into our community. Year 4 take a look at artefacts in Judaism



On Monday, the children in Year 4 were learning about artefacts of importance in Judaism. They had a real hands-on experience and got to handle and try on authentic Jewish clothing. The Menorah is a seven branched candelabrum and is the oldest symbol of the Jewish people. It is said to represent the burning bush as seen by Moses on Mount Sinai. Jewish men have to wear special clothes when they go to the Synagogue to worship God. Jewish males wear a Yarmulke which is a cap worn on the head and a tasseled shawl called a Tallit to show that they respect God. The Torah is the most important document in the Jewish religion; It is written in Hebrew, the oldest Jewish language and is the Jewish equivalent of the Bible. The children particularly enjoyed seeing the items close up and loved the shawl and cap.
